Twenty years later, the time has come to see what as become of the fifteen countries that constituted the USSR Fifteen young film directors, promising talents from these fifteen countries (Armenia, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Estonia, Georgia, Latvia, Lithuania, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Moldavia, Uzbekistan, Russia, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, Ukraine) unite their efforts in an international project to draw a portrait of their generation: family and professional relationships, friendship, love.

It is a social, cultural, sentimental and political portrait that allows discovering experiences, visions of the world and realities experienced by tens of millions of men and women from the countries that we only know a little or do not know at all.

How do the generations and cultures of former Soviet world see one another and the emerging world? How do the changes affect the life and spirit of new generations? How do these different societies and cultures feel in the global village that is our world?

CORN by Alakbar Alyev (Azerbaijan)

Malik is in his twenties. He sells corn cubs in the beach where the nouveau riches are lazing in the sun. Melik's father explains that in the time of Soviet Union there was work and more money. Melik will soon start his military service. Afterwards, he would like to found a family. He hopes to do something else than selling corn cubs.

MICROBE by Dzintars Dreibergs (Latvia)

Microbe still studies in school. He is only fifteen. He is undoubtedly intelligent, but he is stands out due to his misbehaviour. He is a skater. He repeats the same figures tirelessly. He hurts himself repeatedly. He speaks a lot about sex but he is not good at flirting with girls. He smokes and drinks. And then, one day, Microbe is found on the street dead drunk. He promises not to do it again. If he can.





POLINA by Roman Bondarchuk (Ukraine)

The old professor Semion Rybkin has discovered and educated very gifted musicians throughout his career. But at the end, everyone quits the orchestra to play in more famous bands. How to avoid that the orchestra breaks down? The solution is found due to Polina. She can play saxophone, trombone and piano. Now she has to learn playing clarinet and tuba. She will become a "one-man band" able to replace all those who have already left.

MONSTRATION by Svetlana Strelnikova (Russia)

"We have nothing else to tell you", "Lenin the Mushroom",

"Putin the Crab". There are thousands of people showing their rejection of the common order in the streets and shouting their extravagant slogans. The refusal of something serious, such as politics, to change the realism of persons in charge. Evading intimidating manoeuvres of the authorities, Artiom fights in his own way: to think and to protest using absurd.
